## From the chair







CITRUS Australia as an organisation hangs its success on both its vision and its mission:

- **Our vision:** a unified industry maximising value and returns to growers
- Our mission: a grower-driven national organisation representing and leading industry in policy and advocacy; research and innovation; market access; development and promotion; communication and information; and biosecurity.

Meeting and exceeding these criteria is how we measure both our relevance and our value to industry.

Our success last season in breaking all previous exports records in volume as well as value means growers are at last beginning to see the types of returns they need to ensure they continue to invest back in their farms and which they deserve for their efforts.

Finally, Australian citrus is beginning to be seen for what it is: not a commodity that should be traded to anyone who will buy it but a premium food that commands premium prices from consumers globally.

The other 'plus' side of this is that as our industry grows in value we see 'outside' investment continue to grow, both on farm and across the supply chain – this is vital for our industry to be able to capitalise on export opportunities afforded us by free trade agreements and growing demand from Asia.

Our first season with an increased R&D levy means the industry is in a stronger position to commission more work – work that has had to be put on the back-burner for many years due to a lack of funds; work that includes post-harvest agrichemical information systems.

Advocacy is never far from our minds as we continue to represent our industry on key issues: labour issues, agrichemical issues, biosecurity threats. It is imperative that our policymakers understand the threats our industry faces and what the loss of this industry would mean, not just to our dedicated families and business across the country but to rural and regional Australia and to the Australian economy as a whole.

At our previous AGM we welcomed lain Evans to the board. Iain has afforded us closer insights into the workings of the political mind – an understanding of how we need to further cultivate those relationships across local, state and federal governments, and how it is not about complaining but about going to them with solutions in hand. We have a new political landscape in which it's not just the major parties that have a say following a surge in independents and minor parties, and we have to build a relationship across all of them – not an easy task but a challenge we have taken up with relish and sound results.

As this goes to print we have had our final board meeting with Dick Estens. Dick has been on the Citrus Australia board for three years, and the board and staff would like to thank him for his invaluable contribution over this time and wish him well as his own business enters a new growth phase.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank my fellow board members for their ongoing support of me in my role as chair and their dedication to ensuring our industry is sustainable and that grower opportunities are maximised.

On behalf of the board of Citrus Australia I thank our small dynamic staff – a team so dedicated and so focused that no matter how big the challenge and how high the mountain, they are equal to every task we throw at them. They are a big part of the reason our industry is enjoying the success it is today.

The profile of our industry is why we are also attracting the support we currently enjoy from our corporate partners and event sponsors. This support allows us to do more and thus assist our industry more. There are many industries these sponsors could chose yet they chose us – they choose you – so let's support them in return when we can.

The last thank you must go to the grower members of Citrus Australia who put their hard-earned dollars up so that we may grow the industry, fight for the industry and represent the industry in the way it deserves.

I wish you all continued success in the seasons ahead.

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## From the CEO



Citrus Australia strongly advocated against the 32.5% backpacker tax – a tax that was eventually reduced after considerable industry lobbying and lengthy parliamentary debate to 15% on every dollar earned by backpacker workers from 1 January 2017.

This is the first report on the full twelve months of a new calendar financial year which also marks an incredible year for most of the Australian citrus industry.

For the first time Australian citrus exports exceeded 215,000 tonnes and a value of over \$325 million. One prominent Riverina grower/packer told me that this has been the best season *ever* for both navel and Valencia oranges.


I'm delighted to highlight some of Citrus Australia's achievements during 2016:

- Held a successful Market Outlook Forum in Sydney featuring Kurt Huang from the Shanghai import market. The forum, conducted over one and a half days on 16-17 March, was attended by more than 140 representatives from the growing, packing and marketing sectors
- Assisted a record number of growers and hectares to be registered online for export
- Celebrated the third round of tariff cuts under the Japan Australia Economic Partnership Agreement with Australian Minister for Trade Steve Ciobo
- Pioneered the first Australian fresh produce WeChat lecture to promote Australian citrus. WeChat is the biggest social media platform in China, with more than 700 million active users. The lecture was delivered to the invitation-only fresh produce network of 11 groups and 4,000 participants and was followed by a Q&A, running for 90 minutes in total

eradication of exotic fruit flies in the Torres Strait. Exotic fruit flies entering mainland Australia through Torres Strait could have a catastrophic effect if allowed to spread via Cape York to citrus-growing regions

- Welcomed a long-overdue increase in the national citrus R&D and biosecurity levies. These levies were raised from 1 July 2016 to \$3.20/tonne (remitted to Horticulture Innovation Australia) and \$0.30/tonne (remitted to Plant Health Australia) respectively, representing a total increase of \$1.50/tonne. An additional \$0.75/tonne is paid to Horticulture Innovation Australia on oranges for marketing
- Strongly advocated against the 32.5% backpacker tax – a tax that was eventually reduced after considerable industry lobbying and lengthy parliamentary debate to 15% on every dollar earned by backpacker workers from 1 January 2017
- Published four quarterly editions of Australian Citrus News magazine, 24 fortnightly e-newsletters and 11 Season Updates and attracted more than 1,000 followers on Twitter
- A surplus of \$4,883 was recorded for the twelve months ending 31 December 2016.

We would like to thank our grower and affiliate members, corporate partners, volunteers and sponsors for their ongoing support.

The outlook for 2017 remains just as positive with strong global demand for premium fruit driving increased industry confidence, new plantings and purchases. Citrus Australia will continue to facilitate growth whilst boosting our biosecurity and protecting our key markets.



A second international presenter, Vanessa Perez from Austrade in Manila, delivered insights into the rapidly expanding Philippine market.

Citrus Australia market information and quality manager Nathan Hancock and citrus market access manager David Daniels also addressed the group.

More than 140 representatives from citrus growing, packing and marketing met in Sydney to explore current and future trends in the export, domestic and juice sectors.


Topics addressed included:


- Tree planting and production trends over the next 10 years

- Prospects for new juice products and juice exports.

With the Australian citrus industry's key players gathered at a single venue, there were invaluable networking opportunities both during the event itself and over drinks and an evening meal on the popular accompanying Sydney Harbour dinner cruise.

An overseas study tour courtesy of Citrus Australia and equipment manufacturer MAF Oceania was awarded as a door prize to one attendee, Mark Trott, Mundubbera, Queensland. This enabled Mark to travel to Spain and France with fellow Australian grower-packers in early November as part of a week-long visit to packing sheds, research facilities and orchards around Barcelona and Montauban (near Toulouse).


# National Residue Survey citrus program 2011-16

# Boosting biosecurity


HUANGLONGBING (HLB), Asian citrus psyllid, *Xylella* (citrus variegated chlorosis) and exotic fruit flies were the key focus areas for the citrus biosecurity team in 2016.

Horticulture Innovation Australia (HIA); Plant Health Australia (PHA) and Citrus Australia have joined forces to deliver enhanced biosecurity activities to protect the Australian citrus industry from serious exotic pests and diseases.

#### Steps have included:


Setting up a 'first detectors network' of trained crop scouts/ growers, with all monitoring crops regularly at farm level for any sign of exotic pests

- Assisting NSW Government officers with surveillance of backyard citrus plants in Sydney and peri-urban Gosford on the NSW Central Coast
- Working together with Northern Australia Quarantine Strategy staff searching orchards in Western Australia's Ord River region, and retail nurseries (including Bunnings and Masters)
- Increasing preparedness for the arrival of Asian citrus psyllid and huanglongbing by reviewing contingency plans to address any potential detection of the vectorpest complex that has caused widespread citrus tree devastation overseas





from the north through the Torres Strait (using the increased PHA citrus biosecurity levy).
